THE EPIPHANY, OR**

THE MANIFESTATION OF CHRIST TO THE GENTILES

Anglican Christians traditionally celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6th, following the twelve days of the Christmas season. While in that time we remember the birth of Jesus, during the Epiphany we commemorate His manifestation to the Gentiles in the person of the “wise men” of the East, commonly called the *Magi*. Although Jesus is a Jew in the lineage of David and was circumcised and named on the eighth day, He is nonetheless God Incarnate. Jesus Christ is the Savior and *Emmanuel* who came down from heaven, not only for the Jews, but for all people. The Magi were the simply first non-Jews to come and adore Him, foreshadowing the inclusion of the Gentiles into the New Testament Church.

Epiphany means “manifestation” or “illumination”, so observing this special season is about celebrating Our Lord who revealed Himself to liberate all peoples from sin and death and to unite them in one Body. Epiphany develops the Christmas story, further unveiling the mystery of Jesus’ Divinity, His anointing to be the Christ, and His power to institute a New Covenant between God in His People. Those of us who are made regenerate in the waters of Holy Baptism owe a great debt of praise and thanksgiving to our God who lowered Himself to become one of us so that we may become one in Him.
